Middlesbrough lies in the centre of Cleveland Fire Authority area and consists of 20 local wards. It is the most densely populated and urbanised authority in Cleveland. Middlesbrough is bound by the River Tees, North Yorkshire Moors National Park and two other local authorities. The current population of this area is 148,285 living in 65,988 dwellings.

Specific risks within the district include: A19, A66, A174, Teesside Park, James Cook University Hospital, Riverside Stadium, Teesside University and Middlesbrough town centre.

SAFER HOMES

- 70% Coverage across the Brigade area
- 1513 smoke alarms fitted
- 3,908 visits completed
- 544 referrals made to external agencies for assistance

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- Attended a Community Safety Event at both Saltersgill shops and Holyrood Court shops with Partner Agency's (Thirteen Group and Middlesbrough Community Safety Teams).
- Multi agency patch walks were carried out with Middlesbrough Council neighbourhood safety teams. Areas covered were Acklam Hall, Saltersgill shops, Kader shops, Trimdon shops and alleyways around Ayresome ward. The walks were used to identify fly tipping areas to help reduce deliberate fire setting.
- Attended Chinese community Christmas event, engaged with 150 families.

CURRENT AND EMERGING ISSUES

Deliberate Primary Fires

The number of deliberate primary fires has risen between April and December 2024 when compared to 2023 increasing by 19% from 94 to 112. When examining the key subtypes for deliberate primary fires 67 (60%) of incidents were made up of vehicles with a further 18 (16%) incidents classified as dwellings. The top location during this time was Longlands and Beechwood with 25 incidents.

Deliberate Vehicle Fires

The number of deliberate vehicle fires continues to cause problems in the district with a 29% increase between April and December 2024 when measured against the same period in 2023 from 52 to 67 incidents. The Brigade continue to monitor these incidents alongside Cleveland Police to identify key offenders and patterns.

HOTSPOT DATA

- The top 5 wards for all fire incidents between April and December 2024 accumulatively accounted for 59% of fires across the district.
- Central had the highest level of fire incidents with 144 of which 116 (81%) were deliberate.
