Cleveland Fire Brigade Performance April - March 2024/25

Cleveland Fire Authority provides a fire and rescue service to an area covering approximately 597km2 and consists of four unitary authorities (Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar & Cleveland and Stockton). The current population of this area is 579,287 living in 267,396 dwellings.

Cleveland is the 7th most densely populated fire authority area in England and suffers from typical inner city type problems.

Our 83 wards include the 2nd most deprived ward nationally (North Ormesby) with 28 falling within the 10% most deprived wards nationally.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

In February 2025, the Brigade published an article highlighting the top five causes of house fires across the Brigade area during the period from 1 April to 31 December 2024. A total of 130 incidents were recorded, with the leading causes identified as follows:

- 1. Combustible items too close to heat sources 23 incidents
- 2. Faulty equipment or appliances 16 incidents
- 3. Cooking-related incidents 15 incidents
- 4. Careless handling 14 incidents
- 5. Other causes (e.g. pets starting fires, knocking over candles, accidentally turning on cookers) 13 incidents

By sharing this vital information, the Brigade aims to raise awareness within local communities and encourage the adoption of simple safety measures to help reduce the risk of fires in the home.

HMICFRS Inspection

The Service's performance was assessed across 11 key areas, receiving 'Requires Improvement' in three areas, 'Adequate' ratings in four and 'Good' ratings in four others. The outcome is positive for the Service and will be supported by a clear action plan to address the recommendations.

Chief Fire Officer Peter Rickard said:

"I welcome the findings of our latest HMICFRS inspection, and I want to take this opportunity to thank every single member of staff for their continued dedication, professionalism, and pride in the work we do. I accept the HMICFRS findings in full and am pleased that the positivity of our staff and our commitment to keeping our communities safe has been recognised.

"While we are proud of the areas where we are performing well, we fully acknowledge the areas identified for improvement. We will be producing an action plan to address these and many of the actions will form part of our new Community Risk Management Plan (CRMP), which we are currently developing. We remain committed to learning, evolving, and supporting both our staff and communities even more effectively."

HOTSPOT DATA

- 5 wards were the highest for all fire incidents and cumulatively accounted for 19% of fires across the Brigade area
- 3 of the 5 wards are in Middlesbrough and 2 in Redcar & Cleveland district.
